# NPW fall conference set for Osceola

I'd like to welcome you all to Osceola for the 2017 NPW Fall Conference.

I've been wanting to host you for quite a while and now I'm glad it's finally going to happen. The conference is set for Saturday, Sept. 30, in the St. Vincent Ferrer Catholic Church parish hall.

The expertise and achievements of members will be highlighted during program portions of the fall conference. NPW Professional Development Director Jill Claflin has organized two panel discussions, one focusing on freelancing, the other on the communications contest.

The morning session, from 10:15 to 11:45 a.m., will focus on "The Nuts and Bolts of Freelancing." Several members depend on freelancing for full or supplemental income, and three of them will be sharing tips for how to get started and how to grow a freelance business. They will be joined on the panel by Osceola native Terry Anderson, news editor for agricultural publications produced by Plaindealer Publishing. In that role, he hires freelancers and will share from that perspective.

Among the questions the freelancers will discuss:

• What's the biggest frustration of freelancing your communications skills?

• What are some of the rewards you've discovered?

• How do you set or negotiate rates?

• How do you typically bill for your work -- by the job, by the hour? What about expenses incurred?

• Do you operate under a busi-

ness name? Or is your approach to freelancing more casual?

• Do you typically have a formal contract for each job? What do you look for when you review a contract? What do you watch out for? What would keep you from signing a contract?

• Do you carry any insurance as a freelancer?

• How do you organize your time and create discipline around your freelance assignments?

• What would make you run the other direction from a possible free-lance engagement?

• How do you balance freelancing vs. volunteer communications jobs most of us are asked to take on occasionally?

• How competitive is the freelance market in Nebraska?

• Do you have any experience with online freelance services?

• Has your approach to freelancing changed over time? How?

• What's your single best piece of advice for someone considering freelancing?

If you've watched the awards video at spring conferences and wished you could learn more about the winning entries, the afternoon session is for you. "How They Did It: Contest Winners Give Us the Inside Scoop" will feature four winners from the 2016 Communications Contest sharing the stories of how their winning entries came about. The session will run from 1:45 to 3:15 p.m.

Panelists will discuss such questions as:

• At what point in the story process did you know this was a good one? • Was this an assigned article or one you pursued? Did you have to overcome any obstacles in the story-gathering process?

• What makes this image work so well? Why do you think judges like it so much? Did you get any reaction from readers?

• Did you do much rewriting on this, or did it come pretty quickly into this form? How long do you think you spent writing it?

• What prompts you to enter a particular story or photo, headline, brochure or book in the contest? Is it something you just like, something that you think is important, something others have commented on?

• How do you prepare for contests? Is it something you stay on top of throughout the year, or a process that you put off until you know the full year's body of work?

The NPW contest director will also review the guidelines for entry and offer tips to make sure the entry process is a smooth one.

Both discussions will include time for questions from the audience, so come thinking about freelancing or contest questions you've had. Attendees should head home with a wealth of information they can use.

The 2017 NPW Communicator of Achievement will be presented during the noon luncheon. Also at that time, guest speaker Tasha Walker, president of the Osceola Community Action Group, will share information about the group, how and why it got started and the plan for upcoming projects. NFPW contest winners will also be recognized.

#### FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 29 It begins with a meeting of the minds!

The conference will open with a board meeting at 6 p.m. Friday at the Chances R restaurant, 124 W. Fifth St. in York. Those attending will order off the menu.

#### Do you know the way to Osceola?

Osceola is just a short 30-minute drive from York. From the hotel, take Highway 81 north - follow the bypass around York - past Benedict and through Stromsburg until you reach the Highways 81/92 junction. Turn right (east) and it's just a couple miles into Osceola. As you come close to town, the highway curves a bit to the north, but don't go that way! Continue straight east on the road that passes the south side of the grain elevators. Just past the railroad tracks, look for the Hospital/Fairgrounds signs. Follow them and turn south (right) on Nance Street. The church is located on the southwest edge of town; the parish hall is a separate building just northeast of the church.

Osceola is also about 90 minutes west of Omaha and 75 miles northwest of Lincoln. If you're coming in from the east on Highway 92, go through town and turn south (left) at the railroad tracks. Follow Nance Street to the church.

#### Of course, there will be food ... maybe even chocolate!

We will offer a light continental breakfast with mini muffins and cinnamon rolls, coffee and juice.

Lunch will include pulled pork sandwiches, salads, baked beans, chips, dessert and beverages: coffee, ice tea and pop. Anyone with special dietary needs should contact Terri Hahn, ASAP. Registrants are asked to indicate favorite soft drink on the registration form.

## Drake honored with legends award

Lincoln Community Playhouse will honor Connie Dillow (posthumous), Leta Powell Drake, David Landis and Rod McCullough as Playhouse Legends at the Party with the Playhouse gala event on Thursday, October 19, at the Lincoln Country Club.

Leta Powell Drake appeared in 11 shows from 1964-2009, including Steel Magnolias (Ouiser) and The Prime of Miss Jean Brodie (Jean). She was instru-

mental in the creation of the OLLI/Playhouse Radio Active Players and has appeared in all eight of these shows.

The event is open to the public. Tickets are \$75 each and are available at lincolnplayhouse.com or by calling the box office at 402-489-7529.

The gala, scheduled from 6:30 p.m. to 10 p.m. will include the Legends presentation, dinner, cash bar, auction and entertainment from Playhouse performers.

Each season, individuals are selected to receive the honor of Playhouse Legend. This award will be given to people who, over a long period of time, have made a lasting impression on the theatre and community. Whether onstage or behind the scenes, Playhouse Legends have created the high standards of performance and community impact that have made Lincoln Community Playhouse a cultural cornerstone. Connie Dillow was in eight Playhouse shows from 1994-2006, including Driving Miss Daisy (Daisy) and Arsenic and Old Lace (Abby Brewster). She made a significant impact on the Lincoln theatre community as the teacher and guiding force of the Advanced Theatre Company, held at the Playhouse, for area high school students.



David Landis made memorable appearances in 22 shows from 1987 to 2002 including Amadeus (Saleri) and 1776 (John Adams).

Rod McCullough had a run of 22 shows from 1967-1988 including Of Mice and Men (Lennie) and Cat on a Hot Tin Roof (Big Daddy). He also served as LCP's Managing Director from 1982 to 2000.

### *The path to publication* Self-publishing tips offered at Omaha network gathering

Have you ever considered writing a book, only to be discouraged by thoughts of the competitive world of book sales, literary agents and big publishing houses?

If so, take note: Digital self-publishing might be for you.

That's according to Omaha publishers Lisa Pelto and Sandra Wendel, who provided book publishing tips to members of the NPW Omaha Network on Tuesday, Aug. 22, in Swanson Library at 90th and Dodge.

Digital self-publishing provides authors the opportunity to avoid rejection slips by producing their own books, said Wendel, an experienced editor who has worked on three Holocaust memoirs and four books written by Omaha police officers, to name a few. Referring to authors she has worked with, Wendel observed that "seeing your own book in print is a Zen-like moment."

Further, digital self-publishing banishes the traditional publishing house approach of requiring bulk printings of 1,000 books or more. When books are stored digitally, they can be printed in small to large quantities quickly, a type of precision that has the added benefit of eliminating landfills full of unsold books, Pelto said. Finally, self-publishing offers freedom to publish an Omaha book publishing services company. In contrast, Wendel said, self-publishers tend to be most focused on the stories they want to tell, with some authors wanting only a few of their books print-

in ways that large publishing houses don't provide, Pelto said. "Can they make money from this book?' That's what [big] publishers think about," said Pelto, who is president of Concierge Marketing Inc., ed for themselves or family members.

Pelto and Wendel cautioned that self-publishing is not necessarily a painless process. For example, self-publishing in hopes of sales requires authors

submissions, said Wendel, who highly recommended that authors find a professional editor to check their work. Not doing so is one of the most common "things people do wrong when self-publishing," Wendel said.

Pelto agreed, saying that authors should "put some money into" their work to ensure that their books are well-presented meaning professionally edited, professionally designed and professionally marketed.

The next meeting of the NPW Omaha Network is scheduled for 5:30 p.m. to 7 p.m. Tuesday, Oct. 24, in the Swanson Library Meeting Room on the ground floor. The topic: How Fake News and New Gatekeepers are Impacting the Communication Field.

### Nominations Sought for 2018 Women Journalists Hall of Fame

Writer. Author. Educator. Administrator. Counselor. Business owner. Publisher. Suffragette. All have one thing in common: Nebraska women journalists whose outstanding careers served their communities and their state.

All are honorees in the Marian Andersen Nebraska Women Journalists Hall of Fame. The talent, initiative, intelligence and stamina of these women have made a difference for the profession, for the community and for those who followed in their footsteps.

Nominations are being sought for the 2018 HOF. Candidates must have a Nebraska background by birth or work experience, and must have spent a significant amount of their professional careers in Nebraska. Nominees will be judged on:

• Contributions to the profession.

• Achievements within the profession.

• Service to communities (local as well as Nebraska and/or regional/national). "Communities" refers to both the community in which she lives and works as well as to her professional community.

Nominations must give compelling reasons why the candidate should be selected. Each nomination must be accompanied by two letters of support, each of which addresses at least one of these criteria. See the Hall of Fame tab at <u>http://nebraskapresswomen.org</u> for linkage to the nomination form and guidelines.

Final selections will be made by the NPW Board of Directors. Every vote counts -- entire elections have been turned on their heads when everyone voted!

Many people you know are worthy, so be thinking of who you would like to recognize and be a part of the HOF. It is especially important for 2018 because there are no carryover nominees from last year. However, anyone nominated for 2018 who is not selected, will carry over to 2019. NPW friends and members, as well as the general public, are encouraged to submit nominations from the fields of broadcast, print or online, news, advertising or public relations.

Deadline for submission is Jan. 22, 2018. Honorees will be recognized during the 2018 spring convention in Omaha.

The hall was created by Nebraska Press Women in 2011 to recognize women journalists who have made a difference for their profession and their communities. Portraits of 20 women are in the Hall of Fame, located at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln's Andersen Hall and home of the College of Journalism and Mass Communications.

Marian Andersen, for whom the hall is named, is a UNL journalism alumna and Phi Beta Kappa member who made her mark through community service.
