Let's get together in Ogallala

"It's a Women's World" is the theme for the Nebraska Press Women's annual spring convention, slated for May 3 in the Mid-Plains Community College, Ogallala Extended Campus at Ogallala.

The college campus is located on the southeast quadrant of Interstate 80 (exit 126) south of the Super 8 motel.

The daylong celebration of women begins with registration at 7:30 a.m. followed by a

membership meeting at 8. A light breakfast of coffee, juice, rolls and fruit will be available.

Featured speaker Sen. Amanda McGill of Lincoln will give a presentation at 9

on the challenges women often have when pursuing their career goals.

McGill's talk will include discussion of an interim study related to the income gap between men and women. McGill said studies have shown women are paid less

than their male counterparts and there are much fewer women in leadership and management positions. McGill also will discuss the balance of work and family, as well as self-confidence roadblocks. A brief question and answer session with the senator will follow her presentation.

At approximately 9:45, National Federation of Press Women President Teri Ehresman will speak about the advantages and disadvantages of working in a predominantly male field in science.

Following Ehresman's talk, several other female speakers, including Ogallala Community Hospital Administrator Sharon Lind, Automotive Service Solutions owner Pam Palser and Keith County Deputy AJ Voborny, will also share their views on the challenges and opportunities they face while serving in largely male-dominated fields.

high school journalism contest winners and scholarship recipients who are able to be present, Sherry Thompson will induct three women into the Marian Andersen Nebraska Women Journalists Hall of Fame, bringing the total to 14 women in the hall of fame, which is in Andersen Hall at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln.

This year we will honor NPW's own Gwen Lindberg of West Point, a 53-year member of NFPW, as well as Leta Powell Drake of Lincoln and the late Elia Peattie, who wrote for the Omaha World-Herald in the late 1800s. If you come to the convention, you'll learn a lot more about these ladies and how much they have contributed to their communities, their state and their professions.

So, let's get together in Ogallala. If you know anyone who is a past member of NPW or might be interested in becoming a new member, invite them to come with you.

Just make sure that anyone who will be attending has registered by the deadline of April 21. After that date, the registration fee goes up \$5 and it helps a lot to get a firm number of how many people will be attending. The registration form is on page 4 of this newsletter.

Communications contest awards to be presented at banquet

Nebraska Press Women members will be recognized for their excellent work at the spring convention banquet May 3 as the 2014 NPW Communications Contest awards are presented.

Of the 126 entries by 23 NPW members, 40 won first places and the first-place entries of NFPW members have been sent on to the national contest, with the results of that contest to be announced at the NFPW Convention Sept. 6 in Greenville, S.C.

The Nebraska contest had entries spanning the categories, from books to poetry, to public relations and marketing, to newspaper photography, reporting and editing.

This year's contest directors, Terri Hahn and Bette Pore, will present the awards, culminating in the announcement of the sweepstakes awards winners.

Discussion and questions from the entire audience will be encouraged.

At 11:30, lunch will be served in the shop area of the college. Local caterer Deana Schaecher will prepare two kinds of pasta – baked ziti with meatballs and red sauce and baked penne with polish sausage and peppers in a creamy white sauce. Salad and bread will also be served. Two kinds of crepes will be served for dessert.

After lunch, three women will be inducted into the Marian Andersen Nebraska Women Journalists Hall of Fame, followed by recognition of the NPW high school journalism contest winners.

At 1:15 p.m., NPW's own Barb Micek, a Fullerton journalist, and a new NPW member, former sports writer Nancy Hansen, will speak about teaming up to present a twist on Nebraska history. In their book, "Nebraska Authors Volume One," the two Nebraska natives invite readers to discover the United States and world history through the pens of Nebraska authors.

Micek and Hansen will describe the nearly three-year project in which they interviewed, researched and wrote 52 stories for the 432-page book.

The newly released book features authors selected at random from lists of Nebraska authors compiled by the two writers.

"Nebraska authors have

written their stories," Micek said. "Now Nancy and I are encouraging others to write theirs."

At 2, a driving tour of Ogallala, including stops at Boot Hill and Ogallala Petrified Wood Gallery, will begin. The tour also will include drivebys of the expansion project at Ogallala Community Hospital and the School District's \$15 million project to consolidate three school buildings into one.

From 4 until 6, NPW members and guests are encouraged to shop downtown Ogallala, as well as Trails End gift shop, located next to the Petrified Wood Gallery on Highway 30, or just spend time visiting and relaxing.

At 6, the shop area in the college will be transformed into a banquet hall. Don't expect any "city" food. Rather, diners will feast on preselected meals, a choice that

includes a prime rib sandwich or fried chicken prepared by Brule's Classic Catering. Vegetables and mashed potatoes, as well as pie, will also be included.

Following the meal, the Nebraska Press Women Communications Contest awards will be presented.

A block of rooms (10 double and two single) has been reserved at Ogallala Super 8 for May 2 and May 3. The motel is offering a special rate of \$60 for a double room (two queen-size beds) and \$50 for a single room (one bed). Super 8 offers a continental breakfast at no charge. The motel also has a hot tub and exercise room.

The block on the rooms expires April 11, as does the rate. Call Super 8 directly to make a reservation at (308) 284-2076 and tell them you are with Nebraska Press Women.

Super 8 is located directly north of the Mid-Plains Community College, Ogallala campus.

Cost of the full-day conference, including all meals, is \$45. The cost for guest meals for lunch is \$15. Dinner is \$25.
