## NPW fall convention is set for Oct. 20 in Grand Island

The historic Hargis Mansion in Grand Island will be the setting for the 2012 Nebraska Press Women fall convention set for Saturday, Oct. 20. With election of new officers and the announcement of the 2012 Communicator of Achievement, along with speakers and workshops, the day is shaping up to be a busy one.

This will be the first fall conference to adopt a new format since NPW members voted on it a couple of years ago. Designed to be a "drive-in, drive-out" event, all activities will be finished by midafternoon, with no evening banquet planned. The idea is to encourage more members to attend the fall meeting, as an overnight stay won't be necessary.

Weekend activities will start with an NPW board meeting at 6 p.m. Friday at the El Tapatio Mexican restaurant, 2610 S. Locust, just a couple of blocks from our hotel. The back party room has been reserved and board members will order off the menu. All members are invited to attend the Friday meeting. After the meeting, the

hospitality suite will be open at the Rodeway Inn, 3205 S. Locust (more about the hotel later) for anyone who wants to stop by.

Registration starts at 8:30 A.м. Saturday at the Grand Island Woman's Club, 1109 W. Second (which is Highway 30 going through Grand Island). A breakfast buffet of mini cinnamon rolls, bagels, muffins, etc., will be available, along with fruit, coffee and juice. The general membership meeting starts at 9 A.M. and will include electing new officers for a two-year term. The rest of the day's schedule includes a workshop, luncheon speaker and panel discussion, along with lunch and the COA announcement. Tours of the mansion will be offered after the afternoon session.

Scheduled speakers include George Ayoub and Jean Lukesh.

Ayoub will offer ideas for "Personal Columns and Blogs," beginning at 10:45 A.M. He is a senior writer and columnist for The Grand Island Independent, where he has written for 18 years.

Located at 1109 W. Second St., the Andrew M. Hargis House has been home to the Grand Island Woman's Club since 1953. Built in 1898, the mansion is an example of the Queen Anne style and also incorporates Neo-Classical Revival detailing in its design. Most of the house retains its period details and the club has been working steadily over the years to restore the place, one room at a time. One of its main features is a stained-glass window on the west side of the house (it's boxed in to protect it and can only be seen from the inside). Hargis founded the Grand Island Business and Normal College in 1885. The house is listed on the National **Register of Historic Places.**

## NPW to elect new officers at fall meeting

New officers of Nebraska Press Women will be elected at the organization's Saturday, Oct. 20, business meeting in Grand Island. The officers will serve a two-year term. The nominating committee, composed of Glennis Nagel, Sara Giboney and Barb Batie, chair, submit the following names. Additional nominations may be made from the floor during the election of officers.

BETTE PORE of Grand Island is the nominee for NPW president.

Pore is copy editor at The Grand Island Independent, a position she has held since 2002. A

member of NFPW since 1994, Pore was president of South Dakota Press Women as well as SDPW communications contest director and newsletter editor before moving to Nebraska.

Since joining NPW, she has served as high school contest director from 2003 through 2006, professional communications contest director from 2006 through 2010, and vice president from 2010 through 2012. As vice president, Pore organized the first two induction ceremonies into the new Marian Andersen Nebraska Women Journalists Hall of Fame. She is also updating the leadership manual for distribution to new officers and board members on Oct. 20.

SHERRY THOMPSON of Omaha is the nominee for NPW vice

president. Thompson is the communications director and program man-

for the Wom-en's Fund of Omaha in addition to being a free-lance writer and editor.

She has an extensive background in communications, including newspaper and magazine writing and editing, employment communications, corporate relations and public relations.

A member of NFPW since 1983, Thompson was active in the Illinois Women's Press Association where she was newsletter editor and also in Louisiana Press Women before joining NPW. Thompson was NPW treasurer from 2008 through 2012 and was also co-chair and treasurer for the 2011 NFPW Conference that was co-hosted by Iowa and Nebraska Press Women.

MARY PIERCE of Ogallala is the nominee for NPW secretary. Pierce

is the news editor of the Keith County News. A member of NPW since 1988, Pierce served

In addition, Geery-Zink was one of NPW's two representatives on the 2011 NFPW Conference Planning Committee, taking charge of obtaining, organizing and scheduling speakers for the three-day event. She recently returned from Scottsdale, AZ, where she was Nebraska's nominee for Communicator of Achievement at the 2012 NFPW Conference. Geery-Zink is also president of the Unitarian Church of Lincoln which is embarking on a capital campaign to raise funds for a building addition.

In addition to column writing, he also works on major projects and develops content for the paper's website, theindependent.com. He is an adjunct professor at Doane College, teaching political science, ethics and persuasion.

He is the author of two novels, both first serialized in The Independent, and is currently working on a book of his columns. His other bio information includes growing up in Grand Island, a couple college degrees, a decade living in Los Angeles, 41 years of marriage, 19 years of fatherhood, and about 3,000 columns filed on deadline. One of his books will be available for purchase at the convention.

Lukesh will offer ideas for "Writing in a Reader-Friendly Way—or Everything I Know I Learned From Reading Cereal Boxes and Mad Magazine."

She is a retired educator who spent many years with Grand Island Public Schools. She regularly writes the "Nebraska Trivia Ouiz" and an occasional article for Nebraska Life magazine, as well as a few op-ed articles for The Grand Island Independent and the North Platte Bulletin, A Mari Sandoz Award winner, she is the author of three Nebraska history biographies, a historical/literary biography, a children's picture book, and a popular Nebraska studies textbook. Her writings have won five national, two state and two literary arts book awards.

A graduate of Denver University Publishing Institute, she worked for years for various small presses and periodicals as a freelance author, editor and publisherher avocation. Her vocation was as a longtime (but now retired) school librarian and teacher with several degrees and endorsements, including two master's degrees (English education and history education) and a doctorate (Ed.D. in curriculum and instruction).


A past president and soonto-be a life member of the Nebraska Writers Guild, Lukesh is a member of several national writing organizations, including Sisters In Crime, a national organization of women mystery writers; the Society of Children's Book Writers and Illustrators; Western Writers of America: the Text and Academic Authors Association; Women Writing the West; and several library, reading and history organizations. She is currently writing her next three Quick Reading Nebraska history biography books—while several more manuscripts languish in her computer, waiting for the chance to engage with readers.

Lukesh will have several of her books available for purchase, including "The Nebraska Adventure," a Nebraska studies

textbook; "Lucky Ears: The True Story of Ben Kuroki, World War II Hero," "Sky Rider: The Story of Evelyn Sharp" and "Wolves in Blue: Stories of the North Brothers and Their Pawnee Scouts." Most of her books sell for \$10 to \$15, with the exception of the textbook, which if \$40 (available in limited quantities).

A panel discussion focusing on covering local government, public records and open meeting laws is scheduled for Saturday afternoon. While the panel lineup is still being finalized, members will include representatives of area newspapers and television stations.

Lunch will feature a pasta bar provided by Megan Yutesler of Meg's Catering in St. Paul. Two pastas, two sauces, a creamy chicken lasagna, salad and bread

## Nebraska high school students 15 members win 5 national awards receive

Nebraska high school journalism students captured five awards in this year's National Federation of Press Women Communication Contest. Awards were presented at NFPW's annual conference Youth Luncheon, Sept. 22 in Scottsdale, Arizona.

Omaha Westside students earned three awards and Hastings High School students earned two awards in the national contest.

Hastings High students won a first-place award and one third-place for their work. Shane Samuleson won first in the video news category with "Skills USA" and attended the NFPW Conference luncheon with his mother to receive the award. Kelli Poplau won third place in the year-book category for "Our Face Place."

Omaha Westside students took two second-place awards and a third place for their work. Skylar Harris placed second in the review category with a piece titled, "Doomsday Playlist: Listen Before you Die." Sophie Goldberg won second place in the single-page layout category for "Page 1" and Amelia Jensen won third place in the feature photo category with her photo, "Scott volunteers many hours at the site of the community garden, planting flowers, plants and vegetables."

Betsy Herrman, NPW high school contest director, said students from five high schools submitted 96 entries published in 2011 into the Nebraska Press Women High School Communication Contest.

First-place entries were forwarded to the national contest, including seven from Omaha Westside students, six from Hastings High School, two from Marian High and one from Grand Island Senior High.



# 'Miss Representation' challenges media's portrayal of women

- Girls between 11 and 14 see an average 500 ads a day.
- 89% of Americans are comfortable with women in leadership—but only 18% of leadership positions are held by women.
- 80% percent of 10-year-old American girls say they have been on a diet. The No. 1 magic wish for young girls age 11-17 is to be thinner.
