Nominations Sought for 2017 Women Journalists Hall of Fame

Would you like to leave a worthy woman speechless – in a good way, of course? Speechless, because her admirers supported her induction into the Marian Andersen Nebraska Women Journalists Hall of Fame. More than one of the past 18 recipients have indeed been speechless when they were notified that they would be inducted into the HOF. What an honor for them, and for the persons who nominated her and provided letters of support.

So many women, living and deceased, from all facets of the journalism profession are worthy to be a member of the HOF for outstanding careers and service to Nebraska. You know who they are. Begin, now, to consider who to nominate for 2017. Then, take action by reviewing the guidelines and nominating your candidate.

Nominees must have a Nebraska background by birth or work experience and have spent a significant amount of their professional careers in Nebraska. Deadline for submission is Jan. 20, 2017. Honorees will be recognized during the 2017 spring convention at North Platte.

NPW friends and members, as well as the general public, are encouraged to participate with nomination submissions for women whose careers included broadcast, print or online, news, advertising or public relations. Nominations submitted in 2016 will be considered again in 2017, so it is unnecessary to resubmit those nominations.

Nominations will be judged on:

* Contributions to the profession.

* Achievements within the profession.

* Service to communities (local as well as Nebraska and/or regional/national). "Communities" refers to both the community in which she lives and works as well as to her professional community.

Nominations must give compelling reasons why the woman should be selected and must be accompanied by two letters of support, each of which addresses at least one of these criteria. See the Hall of Fame tab at http://nebraskapresswomen.org for linkage to the nomination form and guidelines.

Final selections will be made by the NPW Board of Directors. Speaking of which, every vote does count. Entire elections have been turned on their heads when everyone voted! So please, build in time to review the applications when they come, and then vote.

The hall was created by Nebraska Press Women in 2011 to recognize women journalists who have made a difference for their profession and their communities. Portraits of 18 women are in the Hall of Fame, located at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln's Andersen Hall and home of the College of Journalism and Mass Communications.

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and Judy Nelson of Lincoln, who also is the author of several books.

Nelson will present a "Sense of Place" overview and get everyone started in the writing process.

"A sense of place can be many things — a physical place, place in

time, place in people's lives and that applies to both writing and photos," Nelson said. "For instance, think of the photos from the 1930s of migrants leaving the Great Plains for California. Both sense of place and sense of time in their lives were written on their books such as John Steinbeck's 'Grapes of Wrath.""

With the workshops' strong hands-on emphasis, participants will write and take photos. Bring your favorite writing tools, whether that's pen and paper, tablet or laptop, and the camera you use most often for professional work, family photos, leisure or artistic activities.

Workshops will feature time outside at the Burchell farm. Half of the participants will move directly into the rest of Nelson's

faces, captured on film and in writing workshop and half will join Potter for photography.

> After a break, the two groups will change places so that everyone has the opportunity to complete both workshops.

> The photo workshop will include a few technical tips, but the focus will be on composition. What do you see through the viewfinder when taking photos to illustrate stories, capture family memories or just take pretty pictures? What are some things you can do to make images that convey a sense of place?

The Nebraska Press Women president, vice president and treasurer each agreed to be nominated for a second consecutive two-year term in office, giving members the opportunity at the fall conference to vote for a leadership team that's ready to carry on the ambitious initiatives launched during the past two years.

"We are delighted to inform the membership that president Sherry Thompson, vice president Cheryl Alberts Irwin and treasurer Lori Potter agreed to serve again," said Ruth Brown, chair of the nominating committee. They will be joined by Bev Wieler, current parliamentarian and the slated candidate for secretary. Brown said that the nominating committee believes this is an opportunity for the organization to quickly and smoothly advance the agenda developed over the last two years.

The election will be conducted during the business meeting at the fall conference on Saturday, Oct. 8, at

Burchell's White Hill Farm near Minden.

Thompson, an independent communications consultant from Omaha, championed development of a strategic action plan for NPW's future during her first term as president. It focuses on increasing membership; providing valued and relevant programs, member ser-

vices and networking opportunities; and increasing NPW's visibility. Thompson was honored as NPW's Communicator of Achievement in 2012. She played a huge role in planning and fundraising for the 2011 NFPW Conference that Nebraska and Iowa co-hosted, was NPW treasurer for two terms and was vice president for one term. Before moving to Nebraska,

Thompson served on the boards of the Louisiana Press Women and the Illinois Women's Press Association.

Irwin, a communications professional at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, cochaired NPW's successful and well-attended convention this spring in Lincoln. As vice president, she served on the

committee that worked on the NPW action plan, and she coordinated the nomination, election and recognition of new members of the Marian Andersen Nebraska Women Journalists Hall of Fame. Prior to her election as vice president, Irwin served two terms as membership chair, a term as Communicator of Achievement chair, helped with the 2011 NFPW conference in Nebraska and Iowa, and organized the 2009 fall convention in Gothenburg. Irwin was honored as NPW's Communicator of Achievement in 2006.

Potter, Kearney Hub reporter and columnist, has held nearly every leadership position in NPW, including two terms as president. She also is a past president of the NFPW where she held other offices and directorships prior to her election. As NPW treasurer for the past two years, Potter led the review of NPW investments and future

financial needs of the organization. She is a member of the board's finance committee and is the action team leader for membership in the strategic plan implementation. She is a two-time NPW Communicator of Achievement, recognized in 1995 and 2015.

Wieler, a reporter at the West Point News, joined

NPW in 2012, and since then has regularly written post-conference news stories for the NPW newsletter. She also served as co-chair with Bette Pore of the high school communications contest and later was appointed NPW parliamentarian, a post that she held for the past two years. As such, Wieler was responsible for assuring that meetings ran effi-

ciently and that all policies and proper procedures were followed. As secretary, Wieler will record minutes of board meetings and of the general membership meetings; she will also maintain NPW's file of official minutes.

"This is a strong lineup of talented and dedicated women," said Jill Claflin, committee member. "We know the skills they bring, and we are excited to see what they accomplish over the next two years."
