Creighton University is host
for spring conference

Creighton University in Omaha is the site for Nebraska Press Women's April 20 spring conference, which will focus on Then, Now and *Beyond.* It's a fitting topic for both the conference and the university, which was established in 1878 and has expanded in the last decade and now encompasses 130 acres of campus. New additions include The Harper Center and the Ryan Center for women's athletics, both on the east end of campus. The campus bookstore is located in the Harper Center. The university has more than 7,700 students from across the United States and 41 countries, and it offers more than 50 undergraduate and 20-plus graduate programs.

The Princeton Review listed Creighton as one of the nation's top 377 colleges and universities in the 2013 edition of the annual college guide. The university also made the top 20 list in two categories related to qualify of life activities.

The conference will begin at 8:30 A.M. with registration, coffee and rolls in the Hitchcock Communication Arts building, where Eileen Wirth, Ph.D., NPW member and chair of the Department of Journalism, Media and Computing, will welcome attendees and show them around. The new department is a cuttingedge and forward-thinking department that prepares graduates for success in an information-rich world by melding programs in journalism, graphic design and computer science.

From there, the conference moves to the nearby Skutt Student Center for the remainder of the day. The membership meeting takes place from 9:30 to 10:30. Wirth, who

PRESIDENT'S COLUMN

In the two years I served as vice president of Nebraska Press Women, I had the privilege of being involved in creating the Marian Andersen Nebraska Women Journalists Hall of Fame and inducting the first two groups of amazing women into the hall of fame.

The hall, located at Andersen Hall on the UNL campus, now has the photos and biographies of nine women who have been inducted. Two more, Clara Colby and Maxine Moul, will be inducted during the awards luncheon at the NPW Spring Convention April 20 at Creighton University in Omaha.

Colby, who lived in Beatrice from 1872 to 1904, edited and published *The Women's Tribune* for 26 years, informing isolated Midwestern readers about the women's suffrage movement. She traveled as a national women's suffrage speaker and was one of Elizabeth Cady Stanton's *lieutenants*. She was one of the organizers of the Women's State Suffrage Association in Nebraska and served as its president from 1885 to 1898.

Moul, who grew up in Burt County, began her career at the Sioux City Journal in Sioux City, Iowa, and later, with her husband, purchased the Syracuse Journal-Democrat. They expanded that operation into Maverick Media with publications in southeast Nebraska. She has been the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Rural Development director for Nebraska since 2009, previously serving as Nebraska's lieutenant governor, director of the Nebraska Department of Economic Development and president of the Nebraska Community Foundation.

During the first three years that we have sought nominations for the

hall of fame, we on the NPW Board of Directors have learned of so many remarkable women who excelled in their fields, most of them at times when it was very difficult for women to even get jobs at newspapers and in other areas of communications. They were groundbreakers who made it possible for us to come along and follow in their footsteps.

We owe them a lot and one thing

we can do is share their stories with the people of our state.

Eileen Wirth, chairwoman of the Department of Journalism, Media and Computing at Creighton University, has taken a big step in that direction. She will be one of the speakers at

our spring convention, talking about her new book, **From Society Page to Front Page: Nebraska Women in Journalism**.

This book chronicles the stories of many Nebraska women journalists who were able to challenge the way our culture looked at traditional feminine roles. From crusading for women's right to vote to fighting for civil rights, better working conditions for immigrants and food safety, they saw great need and they responded in the way any good journalist would, by communicating to the public about the situation and speaking out about what must be done to change the situation.

I hope many of you will be able to be with us April 20 at Creighton for Wirth's 10:45 A.M. presentation and for the luncheon at which Sherry Thompson, NPW vice president, will tell us about the two women we are inducting into the hall of fame this year. We will also be recognizing the high school students receiving awards in our high school contest and the recipient of the NPW Memorial Scholarship.

Conference theme is *Then, Now* and Beyond

Workshop sessions focus on *Then*, *Now and Beyond* as speakers will talk about trailblazing women journalists, keeping up with the skills necessary to succeed in today's communications world and the many facets of working in the communications field.

Lessons from Our Remarkable Foremothers in Nebraska

Eileen Wirth, PhD., never set out to be a groundbreaker for women in journalism, but if she wanted to report on social issues instead of society news, then she had no alternative. Her years as one of the first women reporters for the *Omaha World-Herald* gave her a unique perspective on groundbreaking women journalists who worked in every venue, from rural weeklies to TV.

Wirth, chair of the Department of Journalism, Media and Computing at Creighton University, is author of the new book **From Society Page to Front Page: Nebraska Women in Journalism**. She'll share her favorite stories from the amazing women she learned about for the book during her 10:45 A.M. presentation, *Lessons from Our Remarkable Foremothers in Nebraska Journalism*.

The book profiles women journalists who, over a hundred years, challenged the traditional feminine roles in journalism and subtly but surely changed the

world. These women fought for the vote, better working conditions for immigrants and food safety at the turn of the century. They covered wars from the Russian Revolution to Vietnam, and they were White House reporters and minority journalists who crusaded for civil rights.

"This is a must-read story of Nebraska women journalists' efforts to gain respect and credibility in a field that was dominated by men," NPW Past President Ruth Brown says about the book. "Wirth uses her firsthand experiences to help tell the stories of the little-known Nebraska trailblazers who preceded her. Placing the stories in the context of their eras, Wirth makes observations that will entertain and enlighten both male and female readers as she documents the progress."

Managing Your Ever-Changing Career

Amy Gubser is an executive career coach, certified resume writer and founder of CareerlaunchUSA with

is author of the new book **From Society Page to Front Page: Nebraska Women in Journalism**, is the featured speaker at 10:45.

At NPW's noon luncheon, two women will be inducted into the Marian Andersen Nebraska Women Journalists Hall of Fame. The winner of the NPW Memorial Scholarship and winners of the NPW High School Communications Contest will also be recognized at the luncheon.

The first session after lunch features Omaha career coach Amy Gubser focusing on *Managing Your Ever-Changing Career*. It will be followed by a 2:45 P.M. session on *Reporters, Bloggers, Publicists and More*. Speakers are Loretta Carroll, a former news anchor who now owns her own public relations and communications firm, Carroll Communications, and Deena Winter, a former newspaper reporter and blogger who is now with Nebraska Watchdog.

Options for free time from 4:00 to 6:00 include attending Mass at 5:00 at Saint John's Church, an historic gothic structure, on the Creighton campus, visiting the nearby Midtown Crossing or Old Market, exploring Creighton's campus on your own or relaxing at the motel.

The Awards Banquet begins at 6:00 and will be in the Skutt Student Center. Winners of this year's Professional Communications Contest will be recognized with certificates. Sweepstakes Awards will go to the three NPW contest entrants who accumulated the most points overall.

Reporters, Bloggers, Publicists and More

Loretta Carroll, owner of Carroll Communications, and Deena Winter, a reporter for *Nebraska Watchdog*, are speakers for the final session of the day. They will talk about how their past journalism jobs prepared them for their current positions.

Winter calls herself a *cowgirl flunkie* who grew up in the hardscrabble, frozen tundra of North Dakota, where she looked forward to rodeos, county fairs and picking rocks. She attended a private Catholic college in North Dakota. Based on a teacher telling her she was good at writing, Winter selected mass communications as her major. An internship at the local paper got her hooked on being a newspaperwoman. Her first real job out of college was with a paper called the *Northwood Gleaner*, where the veteran, grayhaired reporter still tapped out stories on a typewriter.

She has worked as a stringer for the *AP* and *Denver Post*, reporterof-every-kind for the *Bismarck Tribune* and city hall reporter for the *Lincoln Journal Star* before leaving that job to become a blogger. When her husband didn't think it made financial sense for her to work for free, she took a paying job in October 2011 doing watchdog reporting for *Nebraska Watchdog*.

Winter's focus at the session is *from reporter to blogger and back again – it's a wild ride in the new world of journalism.*

Carroll launched Carroll Communications and began her career as a public relations strategist in 2004. Prior to that, she worked for 15 years at KMTV, anchoring three daily newscasts at the CBS affiliate. Her reporting was concentrated in the areas of health care and politics.

As a public relations consultant, she has expertise in crisis and issue management, social and traditional media, online marketing and webbased strategies. Carroll partners with clients likely to value smart communications integrating online marketing, social media and web strategies for maximum impact.

Carroll attended Syracuse University–Newhouse School of Public Communications.

Two women will be inducted into Hall of Fame in April

Two women will be inducted into the Marian Andersen Nebraska Women Journalists Hall of Fame during the Nebraska Press Women's spring conference in Omaha on April 20.

Clara Bewick Colby and Maxine Moul have been chosen as this year's honorees. The induction will be conducted during a noon luncheon at Creighton University.

Clara Colby (1846–1916), Nebraska's most prominent suffragist, was a newspaper editor and lecturer whose personal commitment to equal rights resulted in a national career and an international reputation. Born in England, she immigrated to Wisconsin in 1854 and entered the University of Wisconsin in 1865.

In 1872, Clara and Leonard Colby moved to Beatrice, Nebraska, where Leonard opened a law practice and Clara started a public library and community theater. As editor and publisher of *The Woman's Tribune*, which originated in Beatrice in 1883, Colby provided isolated Midwestern readers with news of the national women's suffrage movement for 26 years.

"She holds the record for the longest running suffrage newspaper published by an individual," says Laureen Riedesel, director of the Beatrice Public Library. "While other contemporary suffrage newspapers were being published in places like Boston, San Francisco and New York City, Clara was publishing in Beatrice, Nebraska. Rather than bemoaning the remoteness of her location, she utilized it as an opportunity to write for and about the *Western* women. Clara Bewick Colby traveled to suffrage conferences on both coasts and wrote about the journeys to and from the events, as well as accounts of the conference activities." Colby was a close friend of Elizabeth Cady Stanton and Susan B. Anthony.

Maxine Moul, who has a degree in journalism from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, began her career at the Sioux City Journal in 1969. In 1971, she and her husband, Francis, founded Maverick Media Inc., a printing and publishing firm, in southeast Nebraska and purchased Francis' hometown newspaper in Syracuse. Maverick Media grew to eventually include five weekly rural newspapers, two magazines and eight free shopping guides. By the time the Mouls sold the business in 1988, there were 120 employees, with 80 of them in Syracuse.

Maxine was experienced in every aspect of producing a community newspaper. She wrote sports stories and feature stories, covered city government, edited, took photographs, worked in the darkroom and set type. In 1975, she took over financial management of Maverick Media and was president and CEO in the late 1980s.

In 1990, Moul entered politics and was elected lieutenant governor, serving nearly three years. At the governor's request, Moul crafted the administration's rural development policy and served as chair of the Nebraska Rural Development Commission. In 1993, the governor appointed her director of the

Nebraska Department of Economic Development. After leaving state government, Moul served as the first chair and then president of the Nebraska Community Foundation.

Since 2009, Moul has served as the Nebraska State Director at USDA–Rural Development.

"When Maxine entered public service, she applied the skills and expertise of a good journalist to her work in government and politics. She has been an ardent and effective supporter of rural development and sustainability, continuing to serve the kinds of small communities of which her newspapers were a part," said Charlyne Berens, professor and associate dean, University of Nebraska –Lincoln, College of Journalism and Mass Communications.

With the induction of Colby and Moul, the Marian Andersen Nebraska Women Journalists Hall of Fame includes 11 members. Nominations are open to the public, and honorees are selected by the NPW Board of Directors.

Former NPW member dies

Former Nebraska Press Women member Karyn Stansbery died Oct. 1, 2012 in Bellevue. She was 81.

Karyn loved to both hear and tell good stories, which she did through words and pictures as a freelancer and correspondent. She was a great verbal storyteller, as well. You can find her "Boot Hill-Tombstone History of Ogallala," written for the FUN GUIDE supplement to the Keith County News in Ogallala, on the Web at www.rootsweb.ancestry. com/~nekeith/boothill.html. She told great stories about her work on and findings for that article, and thoroughly enjoyed such research.

For years Karyn lived north of Ogallala, near Lake McConaughy. Both the Sandhills and that wide expanse of water and sky suited her, and were often reflected in her photographs. Later she moved to Bellevue, to be near her daughter, Melody Peters, and Melody's family.

A woman of strong convictions and great passions, Karyn loved a lively discussion. She had a great laugh, and a wonderful curiosity about the world around her.

Karyn served on the NPW board as treasurer. She was the driving force behind NPW's memorial scholarship, and served as scholarship chair in the early years of the scholarship's formation. Later she was honored to be named an NPW Woman of Achievement.

Karyn is survived by her daughter and son-in-law, two grandchildren, a niece and nephew, friends, and a number of lasting memories made with those who knew her. She was preceded in death by her husband, Clifford, and son, Billy, who were killed in a plane crash when Billy was just a boy.
