You don't want to miss NPW's 70th Anniversary conference on Saturday, April 23, at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln: national speakers, lots of awards, give-aways, three meals and cake, too.

Headlining the conference will be Nebraska native Jane Hirt, former *Chicago Tribune* vice president and managing editor, who will speak at 10 a.m. on "The 21st Century Journalist: Adapt or Quit."

A 1982 UNL College of Journalism and Mass Communications graduate, Hirt embodies the conference theme, "Embracing the Future. Respecting the Past."

Andersen Hall of Fame honorees to be recognized April 23

The two honorees to be inducted into the Marian Andersen Nebraska Women Journalists Hall of Fame spent their careers – a sum of 75 years -- as colleagues working at the *North Platte Telegraph*.

Mary Ann Koch Blackledge and Sharron Hollen, both of North Platte, will be recognized April 23 at Nebraska Press Women's spring convention luncheon in Lincoln.

Both were and are committed to their craft and to the people in the *Telegraph* coverage area, at one time 22 counties. Hollen was a reporter for 48 years, covering every beat from 1962-2010. Blackledge found her true calling as regional editor in her 27 years at the paper, from 1968-1995.

As editor, writer and "Dear People" columnist, Black-

A 25-year veteran of the news media industry, she may be best known as the co-founder of RedEye, a *Tribune* experiment to create a successful commuter news and entertainment publication for young, socially-minded, busy adults who weren't reading daily newspapers.

The conference sessions, which start with registration and a continental breakfast from 8:30-9 a.m., will be held in room 109 at the CoJMC's Andersen Hall, 16th and Q Streets where parking will be available in the adjacent lot

at no additional charge, thanks to the CoJMC sponsorship.

Leading off the program is CoJMC Dean Maria Marron, who will discuss the "State of Journalism Education Today." A native of Ireland, Marron worked as a journalist and a public relations professional. She came to the U.S. as a Rotary International

fellow, obtained her masters degree at Ohio State University and her Ph.D. at Ohio University. She was department chair at Central Michigan before accepting the position in Lincoln in 2014.

Both the Hall of Fame Luncheon and the Awards Banquet will be held in the Regency Suites on second floor of the City Campus Nebraska Union, just two blocks away. Transportation will be available for those who are mobility challenged.

The 11:30 a.m. luncheon will recognize two Nebraskans who will be inducted into the Marian Andersen Nebraska Women Journalists Hall of Fame. Also recognized will be first place winners of the NPW High School Communications Contest as well as recipients of the Marianne Beel Scholarship for a graduating high school senior and the NPW Memorial Scholarship for a college student.

Afternoon sessions will again be in Andersen Hall, beginning with a tour of the physical Nebraska Women Journalists Hall of Fame on second floor of the building. This will be followed by Happy 70th Anniversary festivities, with coffee and cupcakes.

At 2:15, the focus will turn to using social media for reporting, for community involvement and for promotion.

The 90-minute session will be led by Michelle Carr Hassler, a national award-winning assistant professor of practice who teaches courses on social media, multimedia reporting and online journalism. A UNL graduate, Hassler was a reporter and editor at newspapers in Colorado, Arizona and Nebraska before joining the CoJMC faculty.

Nationally-acclaimed author Joe Starita will provide those at the 5:30 p.m. Awards Banquet a preview of his

latest book, "A Warrior of the People," due out in November, which is about "the indomitable courage" of Nebraska's Susan LaFlesche Picotte, the first Native American physician. Starita, a riveting speaker, also wrote "I Am a Man: Chief Standing Bear's Journey for Justice" and "The Dull Knifes of Pine Ridge – A Lakota Odyssey." A Nebraska native. Starita was an investi-

gative reporter for the *Miami Herald* before joining the CoJMC faculty. He teaches reporting and ethics classes at UNL.

ledge initially joined the newspaper as a typesetter, then moved to news desk assistant. She soon had responsibilities to recruit and coordinate 14 freelance regional correspondents. Younger staffers learned from her advice on the importance of writing for a community newspaper, with Blackledge taking great pride in their successes.

She also encouraged the correspondents to join NPW. She served as NPW president and treasurer, won numerous awards and was Communicator of Achievement in 1991. Currently Blackledge is Chapter EB P.E.O. historian, and is writing excerpts for a book about her late husband, Keith Blackledge.

Hollen, an exemplary writer, championed causes such as firefighter salaries, a better jail, Crime Stoppers, feeding the needy, and promoting the arts. She also wrote her "Reporter at Large" column by traveling 17 counties, and writing about people, places and things. Editors rarely touched a word of her copy, and she could make any topic interesting -- including weather and obituaries. Hollen was early on the scene of the 1975 Kellie family murders at

Sutherland. A gag order on coverage of the Erwin Charles Simants' trial led to the Nebraska Press vs. Hugh Stewart lawsuit that was heard by the U.S. Supreme Court. That decision now is taught in journalism and law schools nationwide. Hollen has received some 500 awards from NPW, media and community, including North Platte's 2012 Woman of Achievement. She recently came out of retirement to develop a series of publications about the history of North Platte.

The Hall of Fame was established in 2011 by NPW, with funding support by Harold and Marian Andersen, to commemorate the 65th anniversary of the organization as an affiliate of the National Federation of Press Women.

A nonprofit professional organization of women and men in communication, Nebraska Press Women provides opportunities for professional development for Nebraska's communicators.

Drake to receive UNL Hixon-Lied College of Fine and Performing Art Award of Merit

The Nebraska Women's Press Club was founded on March 22, 1946, when 40 newspaper women gathered at Omaha's Hotel Paxton for breakfast, compliments of the Nebraska Press Association, which was not yet open to women.

Revisions to the club constitution in 1960 included changing the name to Nebraska Press Women.

Since its founding, NPW has evolved to include a diverse group of communication professionals working in the media, in public relations and advertising, as authors and freelance writers and more.
