#### Two to be inducted into NPW Hall of Fame

Two new members will be inducted into the Marian Andersen Nebraska Women Journalists Hall of Fame during Nebraska Press Women's spring convention luncheon April 25 at the Lexington Public Library, 907 Washington St.

The 2015 honorees are Dr. Beverly Deepe Keever of Honolulu, Hawaii, and Joan Rossiter Burney of Lincoln.

Burney is a Hartington native who discovered her talent for writing at age 39 when she began writing for the local Cedar County News. Burney went on to become a self-syndicated columnist, feature writ-

er, book author and motivational humorous speaker whose stories touched countless lives throughout Nebraska and the United States. A true community journalist, this NPW member for 45 years has been honored with more than 250 awards, including being named the National Mother of the Year by American Mothers, Inc. in 1991, National Communicator of Achievement in 1993 by the Na-Federation tional Press Women, and Woman of Distinction by the Nebraska Commission on the Status of Women in 1995.

Keever is a Carletonarea native and was the longest-serving Western

LEXINGTON – Nebraska Press Women and guests are invited to head to Lexington in west central Nebraska for the Nebraska Press Women's 2015 spring conference April 24-25. Theme for the conference will be "Growing for the Future." A thriving community of almost 11,000, Lexington boasts a diverse, multi-cultural population and a diversified economy. Agriculture's roots are deep here as crops and livestock thrive with the availability of irrigation and an eager work force.

Tourism is an important cog in the local economy, drawing on a

history associated with the Oregon, Mormon and California Trails and later the Lincoln Highway. Known as Plum Creek until 1889, Lexington convention participants will have an opportunity to learn about this local history at the Dawson County Museum during their

## Survey identifies NPW's most valuable benefits to members – plus much more

Nebraska Press Women members have spoken, and your NPW board is listening. Nearly two-thirds of current NPW members responded to a recent electronic survey, providing solid quantitative and rich qualitative data on topics ranging from what they value most about NPW to conference topic preferences.

NPW board members met March 7 in Grand Island to review the results, which form the basis for a strategic planning process. More information on the planning process and how all members can get involved will be available at the spring conference.

Among the survey findings:

- 62 percent of respondents have been NPW members for more than 11 years.
- Most members found out about and joined NPW through personal invitations, recruiting or word-of-mouth.
- Friendships with other members and networking opportunities rank as the two most valuable benefits of membership.
- 59 percent of respondents usually attend both the spring and fall conferences.
- The top three topics members would like to see covered at conference workshops are writing, social media and photography.
- The majority of respondents (89 percent) keep up with NPW news via email.
- When asked about additional professional development opportunities, more than half (52 percent) of respondents said they would be interested in small-group gatherings by regions in the state.
- Growing the membership was directly cited by half of the respondents who answered a question about what's most important to emphasize when building toward NPW's future.

Written comments such as these highlight the importance of NPW to members:

- "My own experience shows me how important NPW and its members can be in helping people grow and in providing support among people who understand the challenges of the field and the issues of balancing work and life."
- "It has been a great source of support and inspiration by those who know how hard it can be to get the job done. Thank you for nurturing and recognizing my work and helping me want to become better in my profession."
