# From Dynamic to Deserted: Nebraska's Evolving Newscape

Red Cloud has used its history to help ensure its future. National Willa Cather Center Executive Director Ashley Olson has been a key part of that effort. During Olson's tenure, the center's assets have

grown by more than \$13 million. Other achievements include construction of a museum and archive in the Moon Block building; a permanent exhibit, "American Bittersweet: The Life and Writing of Willa Cather;" and securing a National Park Service grant to restore Cather's childhood home.

Olson will offer insights on how Nebraska communities can promote themselves as vibrant business hubs and discuss how Cather's journalism experience shaped the author's creative writing.

As newspapers and local broadcast stations close and newsrooms downsize, much of Nebraska has become what professor Jessica Walsh of the University of Nebraska-Lincoln calls a "news desert." Walsh will

share her research that shows what's happened to Nebraska's news industry in a session that also looks at communities suffer from being in a news desert, and what some Ne-



braska journalists have done to keep local news in their communities.

Walsh will also participate in a panel discussion about the future of local news and the ways Nebraska journalists are addressing their communities' need for news. Her news map can be found at newsmap.unl.edu.

UN-L's Jessica Walsh will join

three central Nebraska innovators in a panel discussion about the future of local news and their efforts to address the challenges posed by news deserts.

Karen Nelson is a freelance editor and designer of print products that include the tiniest (probably) newspaper in Nebraska, Bertrand Town Square. Her work experience includes editing and design for the Bethany Messenger and Kearney Hub newspapers; Harvest News, a magazine-style newsletter for the U.S. Custom Harvesters; and Connections Online, a Lutheran magazine by Sola Publishing.

Shannon Siebert owns and edits Heartland Beat, an online news source based in Henderson, which she founded in 2010.

**B**rian Neben is the editor and director of digital content for Central Nebraska Today, a news website founded by a branch of NRG Media. He was previously an award-winning reporter and editor for the Lexington Clipper-Herald.

**R**ed Cloud loves to show off. The home of Pulitzer Prizewinning author Willa Cather, the town is full of historical and artistic treasures.

Guided tours of the town's best-known attractions are available only with conference registrations paid by Sept. 22. The pre-tour will include stops at the home where Cather grew up, the restored train depot and Cather's family church.

The first 15 registrants will also see a glassblowing demonstration by Kearney artist Taylor Moore, who helps keep Red Cloud's creative tradition alive.
